
I invite you to see our students in action on the stage, on the court, and on the ball fields this spring. As a community, we have much to be proud of. I am excited to see what our future holds.

Changing the narrative for careers in trades and industry

here is a growing demand for skilled workers in the manufacturing and trades industry in Carver County. Eastern Carver County Schools was awarded a two-year Youth Skills Training Grant from the MN Department of Labor & Industry to help change the narrative about careers in these fields. New high school curriculum and learning experiences will increase enrollment in the district's advanced manufacturing programs, increase student exposure to manufacturing careers, and provide opportunities for students to explore and ultimately become gainfully employed in highdemand/high-wage careers.

Eastern Carver County Schools has established a Manufacturing & Trades Advisory Council and a Work-based Learning Council to advise on this important work. Work-based learning includes internships, mentoring, and apprenticeships. Chanhassen and Chaska High Schools recently offered Engineering, Manufacturing and Trades Career Fairs to connect students to local businesses. In addition, the district now partners with 12 local companies that will offer internships to senior students. Addressing district's enrollment growth and building capacity

astern Carver County Schools continues to experience growth as new housing developments are being built across all four cities. New home construction is on the rise, particularly on the west side of the district and in parts of Chanhassen.

The district has been planning for this growth for some time. In fact, a 2019 referendum would have provided funding to build a new elementary school in Chaska. After the failure of the referendum, the district began the process of implementing proposed budget reductions to maintain a healthy fund balance and took steps to address growth in the Carver Elementary attendance area.

Building addition to Carver Elementary

In February, 2020, the Board approved a recommendation from district administration to build an addition to Carver Elementary using their lease levy authority to address the overcapacity conditions from the extensive new housing developments. Slated to open this fall, the 19,000 square foot building addition will accommodate new growth in the Carver Elementary attendance area.

Closure of East Union Elementary

As one of the oldest buildings in our district, East Union Elementary needs more than \$5.7 million in deferred maintenance; the district's annual budget for deferred maintenance on all schools is approximately \$8 million. Additionally, because of the small size of the facility—107 students currently attend East Union—the annual operational cost per student is much higher at this school. Because of these factors, and as part of the budget reduction process following the failure of the 2019 operating referendum, the School Board approved the closure of East Union Elementary at the end of the 2021/2022 school year.

Task Force recommendations

Last fall, the district convened an Attendance Area Task Force to examine capacity issues broadly across the district



and specifically to identify where East Union Elementary students would go when the building closes after this school year.

A number of guiding principles directed the work of the task force, including keeping East Union students intact as a community and not splitting them up. The task force also worked hard to minimize impacts to current students in other buildings as much as possible.

The final task force recommendations were presented to the School Board and approved in December 2021. They are:

- ☐ Move current East Union Elementary attendance area to Clover Ridge Elementary.
- ☐ Move the district's preschool program currently housed at Victoria Elementary to Bluff Creek Elementary. This will free up necessary space at Victoria Elementary for expected enrollment growth in that attendance area in grades K-5. (Note: StormHawks Preschool will be offered at Bluff Creek Elementary beginning this fall.)
- ☐ Move the district's center-based AIM program from Carver Elementary to Chanhassen Elementary.

As housing growth continues in our communities, district administration will monitor the impacts to enrollment and capacity at all of our buildings and will continue to communicate future needs to our stakeholders.

New program begins this fall!

Half-day preschool program takes learning outside

hildren are innately curious about the world around them and love to play outside. Some innovative and creative planning around these two ideas has resulted in a new half-day preschool offering this fall for the district's youngest learners.

StormHawks Nature-Based Preschool is designed for students who want to learn through exploration and who are comfortable in an outside environment for extended periods of time.

This half-day daily class will use the district's early childhood education *Creative Curriculum and Teaching Strategies Gold* assessment but will focus on the Science Standards. This class includes 31 field days at Campfire MN-Tanadoona and regular planning/consultation between the naturalist and Miss Patti, one of the district's long-time preschool teachers.

The benefits of outdoor experiences for children are well documented. When children spend time outside they explore science topics using curiosity, creativity and wondering, becoming better problem solvers and critical thinkers. When children are outside, they take turns, talk to each other about what they see and interact with their peers in cooperative ways. Being outside leads to more time being physically active and developing small and large motor skills.



StormHawks Nature-Based Preschool will meet Monday through Thursday at the Family Learning Center in Chaska. On Fridays, the class will meet at Campfire MN-Tanadoona for field days.

District recognized for excellence in financial reporting

or the fifth year in a row, Eastern Carver County Schools' Finance Department received the **Meritorious Budget Award** from the Association of School Business Officials International (ASBO). The award recognizes easy-to-read and accurate budget documents that clearly communicate the district's goals and objectives and build credibility and trust with the community. The Finance Department also received the **Certificate of Excellence in Finance Reporting** for the 11th consecutive year for their high quality Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. These honors reflect the district's commitment to transparency and accuracy in budgeting and accounting.

In addition, Eastern Carver County Schools' commitment to transparency and being good stewards of taxpayer funds was recognized yet again at the December 2021 School Board meeting. As has been the case for many years, CliftonLarsonAllen, who conducted the audit, gave the district a "clean" opinion, with no compliance issues. This is the highest standard a school district can achieve as a result of an audit. The CliftonLarsonAllen team complimented the district's finance staff on their responsiveness and conscientiousness throughout the process and for the high level of financial information made available to the public.

The agency also performed an audit of the district's use of federal COVID funding. Given the uniqueness of the funding, it is not uncommon for an auditor to identify minor issues but ECCS was given a clean audit for its use of these funds as well. A snapshot of hands-on learning at ECCS

Whether it's learning their alphabet in preschool or tackling advanced placement courses in high school, Eastern Carver County Schools prepares students for life beyond the classroom. Teachers lead instruction and facilitate personalized learning for each student. The goal is to prepare students for success beyond high school, wherever that may take them. PRESCHOOL The StormHawks Preschool program uses the core elements of early childhood *Creative Curriculum* that features exploration, inquiry and discovery to guide learning. The district's youngest learners combine playtime with learning in Miss Amanda's classroom at the Family Learning Center. Preschool is offered in four sites across the district.





ELEMENTARY Fifth graders at Jonathan Elementary started their *Mission: Destination Mars* unit with an experiment. This S.T.E.M. lesson focused on applying observations of materials to define the meaning of *hydrophobic* and *hydrophilic*. This S.T.E.M. curriculum has been graciously donated through the *STARBASE Minnesota* program.



MIDDLE SCHOOL Seventh grade science students at Chaska Middle School West learned about DNA analysis and used it to solve a staged crime. They cracked the "case of the stolen skeleton" by analyzing evidence such as DNA fingerprints, macromolecule food testing data, blood types, fingerprints, handwriting samples, hair analysis and footprints.



HIGH SCHOOL High school students cultivate their school's herb garden as part of the Horticulture Arts program at the Integrated Arts Academy. These herbs are used by students in the school's Culinary Arts program. The unique horticulture curriculum integrates environmental education, ecology, soil science, plant identification and business skills.

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
